They are fastened with silk ribbons or strings, to the end of which are attached small gold tassels if the Prelate is a Cardinal, a Bishop, or a Protonotary Apostolic di numero or supernumerary; tufts or tassels of silk, if he is of a lower rank. The Rubric prescribes that the color of the sandals should match that of the vestments, that is the color required by the office of the day; but at Requiem Masses the officiating Prelate does not wear the sandals. These sandals should be made of silk; no Prelate is allowed sandals of velvet or of gold cloth, and the Pope barbier De Montault, op. cit., Tom. I., p. 70. --Mabtinucci, op. cit....
